### REGULAR MEETING OF THE OVERBROOK CITY COUNCIL

## FEBRUARY 14, 1979

The meeting convened at 7:30 p.m. with Mayor Calvin presiding. Council members Nadine Cordts, Lynn Schoonover, Gordon Hummel, Davy Jones and Dr. Bruce Cole answered roll call. Also present were Frank Boyd, John Jewell, Mr. and Mrs. Ken Greene, Bruce Smith, Chris Cox, City Attorney Steve Jones, Darrell Gilliland, Cliff Fischer, Max Friesen, Jo Ann O'Brien, John McArthur and Jack Kramer. The minutes of the previous regular meeting were corrected, than approved as read.

It was moved by Bruce Cole and seconded by Gordon Hummel to allow the city's bills.

Council viewed a letter from Jim Hasseltine listing four rate schedules, some discussion followed. A decision was tabled for later in the meeting.

John McArthur, of Beecroft Cole and Co., talked to council about revenue bonds to pay for the construction of the two new wells. It was moved by Gordon Hummel and seconded by Lynn Schoonover that a resolution be adopted. Steve Jones, Atty., presented the following resolution:

### RESOLUTION

## Adopted February 14, 1979

BE IT RESOLVED by the City of Overbrook, Kansas that it sell to Beecroft Cole and Company the \$145000.00 City of Overbrook water and sewer system revenue bonds dated 4-1-79, bearing 6½% interest, maturing over 15 years, the first such bond maturing 10-1-80, with the bonds maturing beginning 10-1-90 being callable 10-1-89 or any interest payment date thereafter in inverse order @ 103½, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the City of Overbrook that the city, by ordinance, fix and assess water use rates which will return to the city \$23,300.00 net income after water and sewer system expenses per year, until said bonds are paid in full, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the city that, from said yearly water and sever system revenue, the city shall place \$500.00 per month in reserve fund pledged and dedicated to the payment of said bonds, until the sum of \$24,000.00 shall have been placed in said fund, and said shall be maintained in said amount until the said bonds are paid in full, and may be used to retire the bonds last maturity.

After a brief discussion the resolution was adopted unanimously.

Revised plans of the 1978 Water Supply Improvements, with the chlornator sites moved, was showed to council by Jack Kramer. A motion was made by Nadine Cordts and seconded by Bruce Cole to accept Contract Change Order #1. Motion carried.

Bill Harrison, Mike Dunaway, Orman Snyder, Floyd Greenwood and John Butel entered the meeting at 7:55 p.m.

Bill Harrison and Mike Dunaway, representing the RWD #5, explained that the three water districts, RWD #8 of Shawnee County, RWD #3 of Douglas County and RWD #3 of Osage County, are #merging in hopes of obtaining water from Clinton Reservoir. Local representatives need to know by Mar 7 if the city is interested in obtaining water through this system.

A Town Meeting, suggested by Nadine Cordts, was set for Mar 12, Monday at 7:30 p.m., in the Kansas State Bank Basement. Mr. Dunaway was added to be at the meeting.

Orman Snyder, of the Overbrook watershed office, told the council of a water source from a watershed project. This could be constructed at the Creek, Carbondale.

Mr. Snyder was invited to attend the Town Meeting, Mar 12, with some updated figures.

Bruce Cole reported no change from the Housing Authority.

Nadine Gordts, reporting for the Recreation Program, stated she had talk to the BOR, they need more information for the appraisal because of inflationary costs. She had called Oblinger Smith.

Steve Jones presented a proposed Mater Rate Ordinance, after a lengthy discussion by council, a new water rate was adopted by a 2 to 3 vote. (No. 4 of the rate schedules viewed earlier in the meeting). Also an increase in meter insallation charges. The proposed Ordinance will be printed up for the next Council Meeting, Mar 14.

Motion was made by Davy Jones and seconded by Lynn Schoonover to add four (4) street lights on Surrey Lane and Devon Rd. Motion carried.

After some discussion, it was moved by Davy Jones and seconded by Nadine Cordts that Kramer Engineering be responsible for all the inspection of the Mater Improvement project for the sum of \$6,800.00. Motion carried. Mr. Kramer and Mr. McArthur left the meeting at 10:20 p.m.

Motion was made by Davy Jones and seconded by Bruce Cole to appiont Bruce Smith to another term on the Overbrook Housing Authority. Motion carried.

Council discussed the city's law enforcement.

Cordon Human questioned the checks being written for payment of utilities.

Lynn Schoonover reported lanterns and a resuscitator had been purchased for the Fire. Dept.

Council agreed to order more Saturock before Mar 1.

Bavy Jones motioned to adjourn to an executive meeting at 10:45 p.m. for 15 min. Seconded by Bruce Cole. Motion carried.

The meeting reconvened at 11:00 p.m. Mayor Ufford stated Bobby Epley, maintenance, had completed his 90 days probation period. He is now on permanent employment with the city, and he will no longer serve as part-time policeman.

On motion of Lynn Schoonover, the meeting adjourned at 11:05 p.m.

The March meeting of the City Council was called to order by Mayor Calvin Ufford. Roll call was answered by Cole, Jones, Hummel, Schoonover and Cordts.

Also present were Kenny and Mildred Greene, Frank Boyd, Bruce Smith and Al Miller.

Minutes of the previous meeting were discussed and corrected. Motion was made by Hummel, seconded by Jones to accept the minutes and also to allow payment of the bulls. Motion carried.

Al Miller of Midwest Tank talked to us about painting the east water tower. It is to be cleaned, sandblasted and will carry a 2 year warranty for the cost of \*4609.00 Work cannot be done until fall, however. Midwest will permit a payment plan whereby we make a down payment upon completion of the job and the remainder due in 90 days. Mr. Miller informed us our overflow pipe was damaged and needed to be replaced. He does not recomment plastic but suggested metal at \$30.00 per ft. to replace 20-25 ft. Motion made by Hummel, seconded by Schoonover to accept his bid for repairing and repainting east tower. Completion date was set for Nov. 15.

West tower was discussed. Miller submitted a bid for \$6842 to paint it next year. Council decided to go ahead with the tower inspection and not make a commitment for painting at this time.

Solid waste contract with Greene's was discussed. A motion was made by Cole as follows: Greene's Sanitation to be given a 7% raise beginning July 1. The raise will a mount to 72.00 per month of which ©0.05 will be added to residences (©2.15 to ©2.20) per month and the remainder to be collected from the businesses. If gasoline raises beyond ©0.85 per gallon, Greene has the privledge of renegotiating with the Council. Motion seconded by Jones. Motion carried

Motion was made by Hummel, seconded by Cordts to award Mildred Greene and Sons a 2 year contract. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Hummel, seconded by Cole to pass Ordinance 96(FIPE Ordinance). Motion carried.

Motion was made by Hummel, seconded by Jones to pass Ordinance 97 (Water Ordinance). Motion carried.

Ordinance 98 (Issuance of Revenue Bonds) is as follows:
Thereupon, an ordinance providing for the issuance of water system revenue bonds, series 1979, of the City of Overbrook, Kansas, in the principal sum of \$\\$145,000\$ for the purpose of providing funds to pay the costs of enlarging and improving the water works system for said City; prescribing the details of said bond; and providing for the collection, segregation and distribution of the income of said waterworks system for the purpose of paying the cost of operation, maintenance and improvement of such utility and for paying the

principal of and the interest on said bonds, and making certain agreements with respect thereto, was introduced, read and considered. After discussion, each section of theordinance was approved and, on motion duly made by Hummel seconded by Jones and carried unanimously, theresolution was adopted as a whole. The City Clerk was instructed to cause the resolution to be published once in the official city newspaper.

Rabies Day clinic in May was discussed. Rotaryis to be contacted to help.

mayor Ufford proposed that pruce Smith be hired on a 90 day probation basis at \$850.00 per month. A motion accepting this proposal was make by cole, seconded by Schoonover. Motion carried.

The Citizen and Brook Times has combined and adopted the name Citizen-Times. It will continur to be our official newspaper.

Security to Herberling Hall was discussed.

Thank you notes are to be sent to the speakers of the town meeting and to Dorothy Flory for refreshments.

Cole reported on the Housing project and inquired about the completion of the walk way.

The city treasurer gave a financial report.

Hummel brought up what to do about Heberling Hall. He isto research the terms of its gift to the city and report next month.

Don Tutcher's building permit was mentioned. It is to be turned over to the Board of Appeals.

Larry Coursen's water problem was mentioned.

Solutions to our water problem were discussed. Ufford is to see about a study of the wells from K.U.

Motion to adjourn was made by Jones at 11:15, seconded by Cordts.

## REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

### APRIL 11, 1979

Mayor Calvin Ufford called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Roll call, by the City Clerk, was answered by all Council Members: Bruce Cole, Gordon Hummel, Davy Jones, Nadine Cordts and Lynn Schoonover. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

Kramer Engineering bill was added, #238. It was moved by Bruce Cole and seconded by Davy Jones to allow the bills and warrants. Motion carried.

Jack Kramer was present to have a Contract Change Order signed. Ken Greene presented a list of his new rates for business trash pick-up to the council, the rates will become effective in July. Nothing from the Housing Authority, the owners of the ground for the new housing will mow the area. No work is being done at the sewer change at the nursing home. No action was taken on a letter from the Environmental Lab. about changing the sample collection routes. The city received the water application approval.

Bob Sisson, Lakin Schwanke, and Lewis Godin were present to complain about their water bills. Bob Sisson's bill showed extremely high usage he could not understand. Lakin Schwanke and Lewis Godin's complaint was of the new rates being used for water estimated during a period before the rates were in effect. Mayor Ufford stated the city was within their legal rights to use the new rates at this time. Also, if any change was made, to consider the new price of water meters.

At this time Mayor Ufford thanked the Council for working with him the past two years and stepped down from the chair. Dr. Cole, speaking for the council members, said all the time, extra time, efforts and contacts Mayor Ufford had given the city was appreciated and they were sorry to have him end his term as Mayor. Calvin offered his help at anytime.

At 8:30 p.m. the Clerk read the Oath of Office, it was repeated by Mayor Frank Boyd, Council Members Dr. Bruce Cole, Gordon Hummel, Floyd Greenwood, Davy Jones and Nadine Gordts.

The first order of business for the new Mayor and Council was to take up the water bill complaints. After a lengthy discussion, a motion was made by Dr. Bruce Cole and seconded by Nadine Cordts to compute the Mar bills at the old rates and put the overcharge credit on the Apr bills. Food Greenwood opposed, Gordon Hummel abstained. The motion carried by a vote of three. to one.

Bill Harrison and John Butel entered the meeting at 8:15 p.m. Representing RWD \$5, they ask council for an answer as to whether the city wants to be included in obtaining water from Clinton Reservoir. An allocation has been put in for Overbrook. There is a deadline. The council agreed to give an answer at their next regular meeting in May. A special meeting dealing with this matter was set for 7:30 p.m. Wed. Apr 25 at City Hall

Skip Mann, from the Ball Association, entered the meeting at 3:00 p.m. He ask council if the city would pay the light bill at the ball park as they did last year? In a motion by Gordon Hummel, seconded by Bruce Cole, the city will pay the light bill as in past years. The lights may be turned on at anytime. Motion carried.

Ted Watchous, marshall, reported an increase of vandalism and ask for stand-by reserves to help him. Motion was made by Bruce Cole and seconded by Floyd Greenwood that Bruce Smith, Bob Sisson and David Beasley be deputized as reserve officers and be called on and paid for duty in emergencies. Motion carried.

Complaints of stray cats and dogs were discussed.

The Firemen were given permission to meet at City Hall.

Gordon Hummel reminded council they needed to elect a Council President. Mayor Boyd announced that nominations were in order. Dr. Bruce Cole was nominated, as no further nominations were made, the Mayor declared the nominations closed. It was moved by Davy Jones and seconded by Nadine Cordts to accept Dr. Bruce Cole as Council President. Motion carried una.

Davy Jones will find out what she can about the history of Herbling Hall.

At 10:50 o.m. the meeting adjourned to a special meeting Apr 25 at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall.

## MEETING OF OVERBROOK CITY COUNCIL -- APRIL 25. 2979

An adjourned meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:30 p.m. Roll call was answered by Bruce Cole, Davinna Jones, Nadine Cordts and Gordon Hummel. Floyd Greenwood arrived at 7:55 p.m.

Robert Sisson was recognized and renewed his protest to the water bill for his Champlin station. The subject having been discussed at the April 11 meeting, the council authorized a deduction of 50,000 gallons from the excessive amount that been shown on the October, 1978, meter reading.

Mayor Boyd suggested that the council adopt a firm policy to prevent unauthorized changes in water bills in the future.

Cordts moved that no individual be authorized to adjust any water meter reading or bill and that such adjustments be made only by the council. Jones seconded. Motion carried without dissent.

Fire Chief David Beesley announced that the firemen plan to hold an auction soon to raise money for the purchase of needed protective equipment. Mayor Boyd told Beesley that the fire department should get approval of the council before planning any future fund-raising activities and to make sure that equipment could not be provided from city funds. Beesley agreed to submit a list of needed equipment.

Discussion then turned to the main item of business, the proposal that the city sign up with the Tri-County Water District to provide a reserve water supply for the city and to assume its share of the cost of construction of plant and water lines. Following comments by members of the council and from the floor, the council voted 4-1 to approve such a contract with the rural water district. Hummel cast the dissenting vote. The motion was made by Cole, seconded by Cordts.

Fresent representing the rural water district were William Harrison and John Butel. They said that Overbrook's share of the construction cost would be 18 per cent of the total or an estimated \$360,000. Approximately \$12,000 is to be paid when the contract is signed, and, when the city's meter is in place, the city will pay a monthly meter charge of \$1,500. Any water used will be added to this monthly charge at an estimated rate of \$1.35 per thousand gallons.

The advisability of constructing a large water storage tank near the east water tower was discussed, but no action was taken.

Improvement of the manhole on the LeRoy Shepard property was discussed and action postponed until the May meeting.

Upon motion by Cole, seconded by Jones, meeting was adjourned at 9:05 p. m.

## MEETING OF OVERBROOK CITY COUN CIL -- MAY 9, 1979

A regular meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:30 p.m. Roll call was answered by Bruce Cole, Davy Jones, Nadine Cordts and Gordon Hummel. Floyd Greenwood arrived at 7:40 p.m. The minutes of the previous regular meeting and an adjourned meeting were read, corrected and then approved.

It was moved by Bruce Cole and seconded by Nadine Cordts to allow the bills and warrants. Motion carried.

John Irwin was recognized, he asked about the sewer line change at Brookside running along his property. He then complimented the council on its undertakings.

Bruce Cole moved to accept the offer of \$225 from Jim Chenowith to improve the manhole on the LeRoy Shepard property. Seconded by Floyd Greenwood. Motion carried.

Nadine Cordts moved to sell Ken Greene the 145 gallon gas tank and stand behind the city building for \$50. Seconded by Davy Jones. Motion carried.

David Beæsley, Fire Chief, reported 5 old fire phones had been disconnected and 7 new ones installed. An auction, to raise money for the Dept., will be held June 9. The Dept. is collecting scrap metal. Beasley said he now has suction hose and has been promised red lights for the fire truck. Davy Jones moved to allow any unusable metal of the city's to the Fire Dept. Seconded by Floyd Greenwood. Motion carried.

Housing Authority - Bruce Cole reported the axence had approved the plans, bidding will be the first week in June. There are 26 deposits at the present time.

Park -- Nadine Cordts reported the appraisals were approved. Swimming Pool - Coleen Reese will be manager, Don Emerson asst. manager and Anita Jolly a helper. The pool will open Memorial Day.

Mayor Boyd expressed a need to enforce the dog ordinance, council agreed.

Bruce Smith reported, that weather permitting, the Brookside sewer line would be switched tomorrow, May 10.

The desire for a new fire station was discussed at length, also, the construction of a water storage tank near the east water tower. Both projects need further infromation and figures on financing. No action taken.

Mayor Boyd read a water bill policy:

## POLICY REGARDING ADJUSTMENTS OF WATER BILLS

The dollar amount shown on a water bill is due on the date indicated regardless of any complaint a customer may have. A late payment of even one day will be subject to a penalty.

Each complaint will be investigated promptly by the city maintenance department and the meter inspected and tested, if indicated.

If a meter is found to be defective, a reasonable adjustment will be made on the next month's bill.

The amount of the adjustment will be determined by city council at its next regular meeting.

Partial payments made on delinquent bills for more than one month's service will be applied to the earliest month covered by the bill and the standard penalty shall continue to be applied to the balance.

The city clerk shall notify the maintenance department promptly of any bill unpaid after 30 days after due date and the maintenance department shall shut off service at once.

Nadine Cordts moved to adopt the Water Bill Policy. Seconded by Davy Jones. Motion carried.

Mayor Boyd appointed two council assignments, Gordon Hummel for water and Floyd Greenwood for streets (repairs and markers).

A vacuum cleaner for the library and use in the city building was discussed. Council agreed to leave it up to the library board to purchase a vacuum cleaner.

Mayor Boyd asked council what it felt the city's intentions were on the proposed Christ Outpost to be constructed northeast of the city? Council agreed the city would accept the new construction if it were taxable property. Mayor Boyd will prepare a letter for Cliff Fischer to be presented to council.

Written easements from residents along the sewer line running from Brookside was discussed. No action taken.

The tree in front of Lucille Gustin's house (on city property) will be cut down by Bruce Cole.

Davy Jones, reporting for the Fair Assn., ask council if the city would remove the boards from the windows at Herbling Hall. After a brief discussion Nadine Cordts moved to offer the building to the Fair Assn., of legally acceptable. Seconded by Davy Jones. Motion carried.

Upon motion of Cole and seconded by Cordts the meeting adjourned at 10:20 p.m.

This special meeting was called by the mayor to consider the resignation of Councilman Gordon Hummel.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p. m. by Mayor Boyd.

Members of the council present were Bruce Cole, Nadine Cordts, Floyd

Greenwood, Garden Hummel and Davinna Jones.

Mayor Boyd read aloud the letter of resignation submitted by Councilman Hummel. Cole moved that the resignation be accepted.

Jones seconded. Passed unanimously.

There being no further business, Jones moved for adjournment and Cordts seconded. Passed unanimously.

The regular meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:25 p. m. Roll call was answered by Davy Jones, Bruce Cole, Nadine Cordts, Gordon Hummel and Floyd Greenwood.

Minutes of the previous regular and special meetings were read and approved. A list of bills was read. Back wages for patrolmen Padgett, Beesley and Duffy were added. Cordts moved that the bills be paid. Cole seconded. Motion carried.

Mayor Boyd presented Change Order No. 4 from Kramer Engineering Co. regarding specifications for the chlorinator building. Hummel moved the change order be accepted. Greenwood seconded. Motion carried. Discussion followed concerning a warning light on the east water tower and the possible use of a telephone warning system. Additional information on the telephone system will be obtained.

Dale Bloom, Topeka, was recognized. He asked if his plans to replace the trailer on his property with another trailer would conflict with the city's zoning ordinance. He was told that it would and was referred to the Board of Zoning Appeals.

Earl Warren presented an estimate of material and labor costs to install a 4-inch water line for the Christian church. After some discussion, Cole moved that the project be tabled until sufficient money is available. Cordts seconded. Motion carried.

Reporting for the Housing Authority, Cole reported that he had signed orders August 6 to proceed with construction of the senior citizen housing project.

Cordts, reporting for Parks and Recreation, said that railroad ties had been emplaced at the swimming pool's parking area, that the pool is paying its own way and that only a few minor repairs are needed. In regard to Jones park, Cordts reported that the city must refund to the state 4% of the federal funds provided for the park. This will amount to \$9,696 within the next year and \$550 of that amount is due September 1.

Librarian Thelma Sloan requested the city's approval of a sign to be placed on the front of the library. There being no objection, approval was given without a vote.

The evening of Monday, August 13, was set as a time for the council and mayor to interview applicants for the position of city marshal. (This date was later changed to August 16.)

The discussion of an ordinance regulating junk cars was continued from the July meeting. A new ordinance will be prepared for consideration at the September meeting.

Mayor Boyd pointed out that the salary of Bruce Smith, city maintenance man, is considerably below the pay of the new city marshal. He proposed that, beginning Sept. 1, Smith be given a pay raise of \$50 a month every six months for the next 18 months. Hummel moved the recommended pay scale be adopted. Cole seconded. Motion carried.

The council unanimously approved the leasing of a propane tank from Heetco, Inc., for the chlorinator house at a total cost of \$200.00.

Fire Chief David Beesley asked if the city would co-operate with Elk Township in enlarging the existing fire station, owned by the township. He was told that the city attorney would be consulted as to the legality of such a project.

Mayor Boyd agreed to ask the State Department of Transportation to move the crosswalk signs to the new school crossing site on US-56.

Cole moved the proposed budget for 1980 be adopted. Jones seconded. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 p.m. upon the motion of Jones, seconded by Cole.

MINUTES OF SPECIAL MEETING OF OVERBROOK CITY COUNCIL, JULY 16, 1979

This meeting was called by the mayor for the purpose of selecting a replacement for City Marshal Ted Watchous, who resigned unecpectedly July 13 and moved away from Overbrook July 15.

Mayor Boyd called the meeting to order at 7:30 p. m. Council members present were Bruce Cole, Nadine Cordts, Davinna Jones and Floyd Greenwood. Councilman Gordon Hummel was absent, hospitalized.

After discussing various courses of action, the council voted unanimously to search for a qualified marshal to replace Watchous and to appoint Grover Fadgett acting marshal until a permanent marshal could be found.

The council also voted unanimously to increase the pay of the permanent marshal to \$1,000 a month and to pay Padgett \$5.00 an hour during his time as acting marshal. If the regular marshal desires Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage, monthly premiums are to be deducted from his \$1,000-a-month salary.

To conduct the search for a new marshal, the mayor appointed a committee consisting of Cole, Cordts and Jones.

The special meeting was adjourned at 9:15 p. m.

The regular meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:30 p.m. Roll call was answered by Nadine Cordts, Floyd Greenwood, John Irwin and Bruce Cole. Davinna Jones was absent, recovering from surgery.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved on motion by Cole, seconded by Irwin. The list of outstanding bills was read. Cordts moved all be paid; Greenwood seconded; motion carried.

Reporting for the Housing Authority, Cole said that it is customary to provide water meters without charge to public housing projects. Cordts moved that the water meter for the housing project be installed without charge. Greenwood seconded and motion carried.

Cordts, reporting on the city park, read a letter from Oblinger-Smith suggesting a second access route to the park. As the council studied plans, changes in boundaries made by the architect were questioned. Corts agreed to contact the firm about the changes. She also reported that the \$550 paid by the city to the state will be reimbursed by the Jones Trust Fund.

Cordts reported that the swimming pool ended the season with a small deficit. She also reported that there had been some disciplinary problems at the pool and that the life guards and instructors want authority to bar trouble-makers from the pool for the season. After some discussion Irwin moved that the matter be tabled, pending further study. Cole seconded and the motion carried.

Treasurer Max Friesen reported insufficient money in the water fund to pay the Jungmann and Midwest bills. Greenwood moved that certificate of deposit #1050 be cashed bo meet these bills. Irwin seconded. Motion carried.

Mayor Boyd reported that some people from outside the city are dumping trash into the city trash receptacles and that he has alerted police to watch for them. He also recommended that extra police and a few firemen be placed on duty Halloween night and the council agreed.

Reporting on the water system, Irwin said the project appears to be earning money at present but that a different approach is needed regarding the agreement for additional water from Rural Water District No. 5. He will study the problem further and discuss it with Kramer Engineering Co.

Boyd stated that no existing ordinance prohibits the operation of a kennel within city limits. Preparation of an ordinance prohibiting kennels was approved by the council.

Cordts expressed the need for county-wide zoning. The council agreed and Mayor Boyd will prepare a resolution for consideration at the next meeting.

Cordts reminded the council that Bill Baldwin had not been paid his rental fee for the chlorinator building easement.

Greenwood moved for adjournment; Cole seconded and the meeting was adjourned at 10:05 p. m.

The regular meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:34 p. m. Roll call was answered by Bruce Cole, Nadine Cordts, Floyd Greenwood and Davinna Jones. Councilman John Irwin was out of the state on business.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved upon the motion of Greenwood, seconded by Cole.

The list of bills outstanding against the city was read and their approval was postponed pending a report from the city treasurer later in the meeting.

The council discussed the payment of salary to City Marshal Vincent Foster for the month of November. Foster was disabled by a knee injury and surgery October 23, but was on limited duty during most of November to handle police telephone calls to his home. Upon the motion of Cole, seconded by Cordts, the council voted to pay Foster's full salary for November, two-thirds of that amount to be reimbursed by Workman's Compensation.

Foster recommended that the 20-mile-an-hour sign at the south city limits be relocated and the council concurred without a vote.

As chairman of the Housing Authority, Cole gave a progress report on construction of the housing project for elderly citizens. The slipe of the sidewalks will be checked to make sure it is within specification limits.

For the Park and Recreation Board, it was reported that the area for the proposed Jones Park has been staked by a surveyor and that the land will be annexed to the city if Ordinance No. 102 is approved later during this meeting.

In the absence of Irwin, the mayor reported that the Kansas Department of Health and Environment on December 6 issued the city's permit to supply water to the public from wells 4 and 5. The mayor also reported that a letter had been mailed to the engineers for Rural Water District No. 5 that apparently will provide the information needed for the computation of water rates from the district to the city. The new water bills have been printed and their use is expected to begin in January.

Ordinance No. 102 regarding annexation of land for the proposed Jones Park was read and approved upon the motion of Cordts, seconded by Cole.

Upon the motion of Jones, seconded by Greenwood, beer licenses for the Strawberry Patch and O'Bryhim's Thriftway were approved.

Following a discussion with the city treasurer, Jones moved that all current bills be paid. Greenwood seconded and the motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:20 upon the motion of Jones, seconded by Cordts.

The regular meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:30 p.m. Roll call was answered by John Irwin, Davy Jones. Bruce Cole and Nadine Cordts. Floyd Greenwood was absent.

Minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved. A list of outstanding bills was read. The mayor asked permission to hold check #502 (Leonard Electric) until goods and services covered are delivered. Council agreed. Release of checks 529, 530 and 531 was delayed pending a treasurer's report later in the meeting, at which time they were approved. Cole moved that all other bills be paid; Cordts seconded; motion carried.

Reporting for the Housing Authority, Cole said the contractor had told hom that sidewalks met the 5% slope allowable in specifications. Mayor Boyd said he would check this.

Concerning the proposed city park, Cordts reported that she had talked with the engineers regarding the boundaries shown on the latest map. The council found no basis for the change in boundaries and determined that the original boundaries should stand. Cordts said the state park board has not met since the last council meeting and it is uncertain when the city will receive additional money.

Discipline at the swimming pool was discussed and Cordts agreed to draw up a set of rules of contuct for approval by the council.

John Irwin, water system supervisor, advised the council that a new approach to the city's method of contracting for a supplemental water supply from RWD #5 had been discussed with the city's engineering firm and was being considered by the rural water district.

Boyd suggested that when sufficient water becomes available the city might consider installing a coin-operated station from which farmers could haul water to their farms.

Boyd also informed the council that the city's agreement with Environmental Laboratories, Topeka, for monthly sewage analyses and reports had been cancelled and a new contract signed with Quality Water Analysis, Inc., in Pittsburg.

Mayor Boyd announced that he had requested CETA funds to hire a second patrolman and a police and fire dispatcher for one year, but did not yet have approval. Boyd also reported that paying firemen and extra police for duty on Halloween had cost \$152.17.

A proposed addition to the Elk Township fire station was studied. Action was deferred pending a proposal from the township board. Boyd announced that, because of thefts of gasoline from the fire trucks, a new lock has been placed on the fire station and that the building will be locked in the future.

An ordinance prohibiting dog kennels within the city was read. Cole moved to approve the ordinance; Jones seconded; motion carried unanimously. The mayor signed the ordinance and assigned it No. 101.

A charter ordinance to enable the municipal court to assess court costs in addition to fines was read. Cordts moved for approval; Jones seconded; carried without dissent. The mayor signed the charter ordinance and assigned it No. 2.

A resolution requesting the Osage County Commission to zone the county was read and adopted. The mayor directed the clerk to send copies to all other cities in the county.

The mayor introduced a new format for monthly water bills and explained an improved system of addressing. The council approved the new systems without discussion nor formal action.

Treasurer Max Friesen reported insufficient money in the general and water funds to make the final payments to Kramer Engineering and the contractors. The council directed him to cash the city's last certificate of deposit so the bills can be paid.

Mayor Boyd appointed a committee from the council to study the city's financial situation and recommend additional sources of revenue. Its members are Bruce Cole, Davinna Jones and Floyd Greenwood.

The city marshal was directed to mail citations to Grover Padgett and Lester DonCarlos for violation of the "junk car" ordinance.

Cordts moved that the city not employ Padgett as a police officer in the future. Cole seconded. Motion carried.

Cole moved for adjournment at 10:30 p.m. Irwin seconded and motion carried.

The regular meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:30 p.m. Roll call was answered by Bruce Cole, Davy Jones and Floyd Greenwood. Nadine Cordts was absent on vacation. John Irwin, apointee to the council, was present.

Minutes of the previous regular and special meetings were read and approved.

Mayor Boyd nominated John Irwin to fill the vacancy on the council left by the resignation of Gordon Hummel. Cole moved the appointment be approved. Jones seconded. Motion carried. Irwin was sworn in by the city black.

The list of outstanding bills was read. The council questioned check #427 to Gordon Hummel for payment for propane heaters for the chlorinator building, believing payment should be made by the contractor. This later was substantiated and the check was voided. Jones moved that the other bills be paid. Greenwood seconded. Motion carried.

Kenneth Greene announced that Greene Sanitation Service would make a bulk trash pick-up in Overbrook the morning of October 13.

Bruce Cole, reporting for the housing authority, said the concrete floors of the four buildings would be poured beginning tomorrow. Cole will have copies of the architect's drawing of the complex made to be posted in several public places for the information of interested citizens. Occupancy may be possible by January 1.

Irwin recommended that Mayor Boyd talk with the State Department of Health and Environment about the notification of residents of an unsatisfactory water test made in July. There was some discussion about the city's proposed hook-up with the rural water district. Irwin will make a study of the matter.

Marshal Vincent Foster arrived at 8:15. He said his part-time patrolmen were dissatisfied with their minimum wage of \$2.90 an hour and asked if they could be given a modest increase. Cole moved the patrolmen be paid \$3.25 an hour effective immediately. Greenwood seconded. Motion carried.

Mayor Boyd stated that there is no school zone speed limit sign for eastbound traffic on US-56. He will ask the Department of Transportation to provide one. At Marshal Foster's suggestion, the council approved the placement of 20-mile-an-hour signs on Ash Street at the middle school.

The council agreed to provide the water meter at the senior citizens' housing project for the cost of materials and labor.

An ordinance prohibiting junk cars on public or private property was introduced and read. Upon the motion of Cole, seconded by Greenwood, the ordinance was adopted and assigned number 100.

Several residents in an area on the west side have complained of rust in the water. The matter is being studied to determine the cause.

The council voted to commend the local muscular dystrophy committee for its successful fund-raising activities.

On motion of Greenwood, seconded by Cole, the meeting was adjourned at 9:20 p. m.

The regular meeting of the Overbrook City Council was called to order by Mayor Frank Boyd at 7:30 p.m. Roll call was answered by Bruce Cole, Davy Jones, Nadine Cordts and Gordon Hummel. Floyd Greenwood arrived at 9:05 p.m.

Minutes of the previous regular meeting were read, corrected and approved. A list of bills was read. Cole moved that the bills be paid, Cordts seconded, motion carried.

Earl Warren reported he was removing the Overbrook Co-op's 2" water meter from the site of the defunct bulk water sales station and would replace it with a regular meter. Cole moved that the new meter be priced at one-half the regular price or that an even trade be made if the city could use the 2" meter. Cordts seconded. Motion carried.

Warren also reported that the First Christian Church needs a larger water line and that a fire hydrant should be located in that vicinity. The council asked Warren to prepare a plan and recommendations for consideration at the next meeting.

Bob Sisson, Mark Godin and Lewis Godin were recognized. They asked permission to use the fairgrounds all night for the Labor Day telethon Sept. 2 and 3. Hummel moved that the 11:00 p. m. restriction on the fairgrounds be waived for that night. Jones seconded. Motion carried.

Reporting for the Housing Authority, Cole said a meeting will be held July 12 at the First Security Bank to sign contracts and arrange for the start of construction on the housing project.

Cordts reported that the ground has been purchased and deed received for the new Jones park.

The council discussed progress of the new water wells and, upon the motion of Cordts, seconded by Cole, approved Change Order No. 3.

The council discussed the trimming and removal of trees, but took no definite action at this meeting.

The mayor agreed to study ordinances to determine the status of inoperative automobiles on residential property.

Drainage and maintenance of alleys were discussed. Boyd, Greenwood and Smith will study the situation and report at the next council meeting.

Cole moved to add the 600 block of Walnut and the 400 block of West Market to the street-sealing project now being done. Seconded by Jones, motion carried. (It was later learned that the 400 block of West Market could not be sealed because it had not previously been blacktopped and this block was omitted from the project.)

Max Friesen reported on the budget for 1980. After the council agreed to add \$2,000 to the budget for the fire department, Cole moved adoption of the budget. Jones Seconded. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p. m. upon the motion of Cole, seconded by Greenwood.
